Childhood development project part of district's commitment to preparing Bronchos for in-demand careers

HOLLY, Mich. — **Holly High School child development program students** recently applied what they learned in class in real time, and in the process helped Broncho kindergarteners bring their imagination and creativity to life.

The activity culminated on May 13 when the high school students visited Rose Pioneer to deliver the stuffed animal monsters to their assigned students and read to them. The teachers provided copies of "I Need My Monster" at no cost for each Rose Pioneer student to take home.
