### **New Holly Middle School on track for fall '25 opening**

he much-anticipated, state-of-the-art **Holly Middle School** is on track to open for the 2025-26 school year. The project was made possible by the generosity of our Broncho community who approved the 2022 Bond.

The new facility will feature modern classrooms, advanced STEM classrooms and labs, a multi-purpose gymnasium, and outdoor features including a new football field and t ack, baseball diamond, basketball court, and outdoor seating and play areas.

The latest project updates include:

- Most of the window installation, masonry and metal stud framing have been completed.
- In-wall electrical and mechanical work is completed, and light fixtu es have been installed.
- Wall and floor tile in tallation has begun in the server and locker room areas.
- Work continues in the office area and classroom wings.
- Metal panel installation around the exterior of the building and roofing ork have been completed.

The 2022 Bond also includes the new, state-of-the-art Holly High School Construction Trades Center, the new Tennis and Pickleball Complex, and the new Holly Stadium.







### District's fiscal responsibility earns straight 'As'

For the second year in a row, Holly Area Schools earned an "A+" bond rating from S&P Global Ratings.

The district maintained a long-term rating of "AA" and an underlying rating of "A+" with a stable outlook in 2024 based on its proactive budget practices and consistent student enrollment, S&P Global Ratings reviewers determined. The top rating is recognition of the district's continued commitment to fiscal responsibility and its investment in the success of all Bronchos.

Superintendent **Scott Roper** said the rating demonstrates the district's continued commitment to fiscal stewardship with the community's tax dollars. Roper thanked the district's assistant superintendent of business, **Steve Lenar**, and director of business and finance, **Linda Earl**, for their critical help in achieving the top bond rating.

### Broncho parent outreach program success in first year

he Broncho parent outreach program reached numerous milestones in promoting student wellness and success in its fir t year.

The districtwide effort has been led by **Cheryl Price**, the district's counseling specialist, and **Sydney Sinclair**, family school liaison.

Programs this school year included:

- **Care Solace,** a mental health care coordination service for school districts. Through this partnership, we helped over 100 families access mental health care.
- **Parenting with Love and Logic Series,** a video series helping parents support their children, with a focus on empathy, setting boundaries, and promoting responsibility.
- Mental Health Resource Fair, featuring 15 local organizations, including counseling centers, family support agencies, and wellness services.
- Anti-Vaping Parent Presentation, a partnership with Holly Area Youth Assistance that included a presentation by a board-certified p ysician specializing in adolescent addiction and recovery.
- Family Yoga Wellness Event, in which families participated in gentle movement, deep breathing, and mindfulness activities.



• Holly High School HOPE Squad, a peer-to-peer suicide prevention and mental health awareness program at Holly High School.

Our district's Early Childhood program also welcomed **Trisha Crotteau,** a new member to their team, who is supporting parent outreach for our youngest Bronchos and their families.



## Holly students get glimpse into jobs of the future

The work of preparing our Bronchos for success and in-demand careers doesn't end in the classroom. Our students also learn about potential career paths through field trips to job sites, including those in the skilled trades, as well as visits to colleges and universities.

**Jennifer Fettig,** the district's director of career programming and business partnerships, said the field trips give students an up-close-and-personal view of the jobs of today and tomorrow.

This school year, Bronchos learned about construction trades on a tour of **Shannon Precision Fastener** in Holly, toured **Michigan State University** during Leadership Day, visited the **Clarkston Family Farm**, toured **Mott Community College** and the **University of Michigan-Flint** campus, and attended a sports marketing conference at **Little Caesars Arena** in Detroit. Students also attended **Careers in Construction Days at Operating Engineers 324** in Howell and a marketing presentation in Frankenmuth.



"These outside-the-classroom experiences introduce our Bronchos to a wide range of diverse career paths, including in the skilled trades, as they begin to plan the next phases of their lives," Fettig said.

## Women in Construction Day provides new perspective on in-demand careers

olly High School Bronchos and students from throughout Southeast Michigan learned about in-demand, rewarding careers in the skilled trades during **Women in Construction Day** at Holly High School in March.

The event, a partnership with **Northern Michigan University.** 

allowed students to discover and experience career options that are traditionally viewed as male-oriented.

Women in Construction Day included presentations from female professionals in construction and other trades. During the event, students had the opportunity to participate in three hands-on construction exhibits.

"We are proud to continually introduce all Bronchos

to new and exciting career paths, and that includes introducing young women to traditionally male-dominated careers in the construction trades and sciences," said **Jennifer Fettig**, the district's director of career programming and business partnerships, who helped organize the event.

Students also took many individual awards in interior design, early childhood education, food innovation and fashion construction. They include **Claudia Klempp, Sophie Tobias, Madison Bolton, Briley Bowman, Rubie Robinette** and **Dakota Teddy. Jennifer Fettig**, director of career programming and business partnerships, won "Outstanding Administrator of the Year." **Miranda Barth**, Holly High School's FCCLA advisor, was honored for her 20 years of service to the FCCLA.

"Congratulations to our outstanding students who continue to excel as they demonstrate their leadership skills and prepare for rewarding careers that support our families and community," Barth said.









### **Performance for Pope caps off band's trip of a lifetime**

he **Broncho Marching Band**'s trip to Italy over Christmas break proved to be a once-in-a-lifetime adventure for the student musicians, who toured some of the country's most significant hi toric sites and performed for the late **Pope Francis** in St. Peter's Square.

The highlight of the trip was a New Year's Day performance at the Vatican before a crowd of thousands, where Pope Francis personally acknowledged the band and thanked them for their performance in his address.

The 70 marching band members, who were accompanied by 100 adults, also explored Pompeii, the Tuscany region, the historic town of Siena and Rome. In Rome, the band explored museums, the Colosseum, the Pantheon, Trevi Fountain and the Sistine Chapel, home of the famous ceiling painted by Michelangelo.



"Our amazing adventure in Italy opened our students up to new experiences and cultures outside the band room and strengthened the bond between our students, their families and our Broncho community," said **Ben Baldwin**, Broncho Marching Band director.

### Broncho musical theater students win big in statewide competition

The growing Broncho musical theater program is part of our district's ongoing commitment to the fine arts and preparing our students for success and careers. In November, the program won some impressive recognition.

#### The Holly High School

Main Street Show Choir and two soloists celebrated wins at the Michigan Musical Theatre Solo & Ensemble Festival at Oxford High School. The full choir earned a "1" rating, solo vocalist Lyndsey Tibbs earned a perfect score of 30, and solo vocalist Marie Halligan earned an outstanding score of 29 out of 30. Halligan, a senior, has been accepted to Alma College where she will be studying vocal performance. **Tibbs**, a junior, also performed at the Michigan School Vocal Music Association Musical Theatre Gala on May 8 in Lansing as a soloist and one of five sopranos selected from across the state to participate.

Lu Harding, the high school's director of choir and theater, said the choir's continued

success is attracting younger students to the program.

"Our entire choir and soloists put in the hard work, discipline and drive to excel it takes to compete at Solo & Ensemble, and it was truly exciting to witness," Harding said.



## Broncho athletic director wins prestigious national, statewide honors
